Customary Federal Resources HUD-Department of Veterans Affairs

HUD-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing Program (HUD-VASH)

This program combines Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) rental assistance for homeless Veterans with case management and clinical services provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). VA provides these services for participating Veterans at VA medical centers (VAMCs) and community-based outreach clinics.



Customary Federal Resources Veterans Administration

Homeless Providers Grant and Per Diem Program

Purpose: to promote the development and provision of supportive housing and/or supportive services with the goal of helping homeless Veterans achieve residential stability, increase their skill levels and/or income, and obtain greater self-determination.



Customary Federal Resources Veterans Administration

Supportive Services for Veteran Families Program

Purpose: to provide supportive services to very low-income Veteran families in or transitioning to permanent housing. Funds are granted to private non-profit organizations who will assist very low-income Veteran families by providing a range of supportive services designed to promote housing stability.

Eligible Activities

HOME provides grants to states and localities for building, buying, and/or rehabilitating affordable housing for rent or homeownership or providing direct rental assistance to low-income people



Less Commonly Used Federal Resources Community Development Block Grant

Eligible Activities

CDBG provides grants to states and localities to provide decent housing and a suitable living environment, and to expand economic opportunities, principally for low- and moderate-income persons.

Purpose: to provide strategies that PHAs can pursue to expand housing opportunities for individuals and families experiencing homelessness

- Encourages PHAs to allow homeless populations better access to wait lists through coordination with CoC stakeholders
- Allows PHA to establish a homeless preference
- Encourages PHA review of discretionary admissions policies regarding criminal activity and substance abuse and establishment of strong relationships with services providers to increase housing stability
- Encourages PHA to project base vouchers targeted to homeless population

LINK Program

Linking households receiving supportive services with housing.

Applicants that are requesting tax credits are required to set aside for ELI households 10% of the total units for which they are applying. Florida Housing, through its Link Initiative, requires Applicants to commit to reserving 50% of those ELI units for special needs households, defined as households consisting of homeless families, survivors of domestic violence, persons with a disability, or youth aging out of foster care.

State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) Program

Purpose: to provide funds to local governments as an incentive to create partnerships that produce and preserve affordable homeownership and rental housing. The program was designed to serve very low, low and moderate income families.

Funding for this program was established by the passage of the 1992 William E. Sadowski Affordable Housing Act.



State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) Program Eligible Activities for SHIP Allocations:

- emergency repairs
- new construction
- rehabilitation
- down payment and closing cost assistance
- construction and gap financing
- acquisition of property for affordable housing
- matching dollars for federal housing grants and programs

State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) Program

Eligible Activities for SHIP Program Income:

- Substantially fewer restrictions than for SHIP Allocations
- Subject to SHIP income limits
- Good potential for Rapid Rehousing, but must be included in Local Housing Assistance Plan

Challenge Grant

Purpose: to assist the local homeless CoC lead agencies and local providers to implement a written plan for addressing the needs of the homeless populations.

The lead agencies may allocate the grant funds to programs, services, or housing providers that support the implementation of the local CoC plan.



State Resources Florida Department of Children and Families

Homelessness Prevention Grant

Purpose: to provide emergency financial assistance to families with children facing the loss of their housing due to a financial or other crisis.

The intent of the program is to provide case management and financial assistance for overdue rent or mortgage payments and overdue utility bills to enable the family to remain stably housed after receiving the assistance

Private Resources Federal Home Loan Bank of Atlanta

FHLB Affordable Housing Program (AHP)

Purpose: to support the acquisition, construction, rehabilitation, and development of affordable rental and ownership housing.

Applications will be available beginning June 1, 2015. The deadline for submitting applications is July 2, 2015.

Private Resources Federal Home Loan Bank of Atlanta

- Pathway HOME Lawrenceville, GA
- Grant: \$100,000 for 8 rental units
- Total Development Cost: \$1,006,310
- Description: AHP funds will be used for the rehabilitation of blighted properties to bring them up to code and provide affordable housing to low-income families. Pathway HOME provides a safe and secure home following the Housing First model, where families are housed and then provided supportive services to address the underlying causes of their homelessness

Grant/RFP Writing Tips

- RFP/RFA/NOFA- application
- Grants
 - Check with funder
 - Letter of Interest (LOI), Proposal
 - Application / timeframe



Grant/RFP tips

- Read the proposal carefully
- Appearance matters
- Timeliness
- Write succinctly
- Explain Acronyms
- Create electronic file DUNS #, Tax ID #, 501 c3 letter, Board list, Organizational Chart, Key personnel Bios, Organizational background
- Review
- Include attachments
- Seek help



Challenge Grant Tips

- Add the following to all the general grant writing tips
- Begin with the end in mind and the "end" is how your proposal is scored
 - This is true for all grants but especially for Challenge because the scoring criteria are not directly related to the proposed projects



Challenge Scoring Criteria

Scoring Criteria (equally weighted)

- 1. "Quality of Service"
- 2. Leverage
- 3. Need



Scoring Criteria Measurements

1. Quality of Service

Based on HUD CoC application exclusively

2. Leverage

- Spend time on this
- The only scoring criteria you have any control over at this point

3. Need

Math



Challenge Grant Exhibits

 The exhibits are especially important because they provide the info scored

The Completeness Checklist is your friend



Other Challenge Considerations

The Lead Agency applies on behalf of the CoC provider agencies

- Create a transparent, time-specific, and structured process to solicit local proposals
- Start immediately
- Use a specified format for local proposals
- Use a local independent review team
- Use pre-established criteria for selection of proposals to be included in application, including a "capacity" measure
